RECOMMENDATION:

Oppose Community Care Ordinance currently proposed to L A City Council

BACKGROUND:

The currently proposed ordinance would result in significant loss of federal housing funds for the City of Los Angeles and drastically increase the number of homeless persons in the City. Our community would be negatively impacted upon passage of the ordinance by the immediate eviction of US combat veterans from shared housing facilities in Mar Vista and Del Rey and several formerly homeless persons from Westchester Park who have secured permanent housing.

DISCUSSION:

The Homeless and Vehicular Living Committee of the NCWP met on August 7, 2012 along with 5 members of the public, representatives from PATH and Councilmember Rosendahl's staff. A lengthy discussion revealed that the proposed ordinance will have significant negative effects on our community and City. The intent of the ordinance can be better achieved by passing effective nuisance abatement regulations and enforcing current ordinances. The Committee voted unanimously to recommend that the NCWP oppose the ordinance.
