SCHOOL BOARD APPROVES NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL FOR PLAYA VISTA

After hearing testimony from many Playa Vista and Westchester community residents, the Los Angeles School Board voted on February 10, 2009 to approve construction of a new K-5 elementary school at Playa Vista. School district staff believes that the new school could open its doors as early as September of 2012.

The overwhelming demonstration of support by Playa Vista residents and longstanding community members from Westchester and other neighboring areas was critical to gaining approval of the school. This community enthusiasm, along with the backing of Los Angeles City Councilman Bill Rosendahl and the hard work of our area School Board member Marlene Canter, brought the Playa Vista school across the finish line.

LAUSD has designed Playa Vista's new 650-seat school to be a model of green building and educational development within the District. The school will take advantage of its location within walking distance of the Ballona Freshwater Marsh and the Riparian Corridor, with a curriculum focused on the environment. The school site, totaling four acres, is located adjacent to the Playa Vista sports park, which students from the school will be able to use. The school is a short walk from the Playa Vista Library, which will be another resource for students. An educational partnership with Loyola Marymount University is also in the works.

The next step for the school is for the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) to approve the Remedial Action Plan (RAP) for the site. The DTSC will circulate a draft RAP for public comment, and a DTSC hearing – likely at Playa Vista – is expected this spring.

According to school district staff, construction is expected to begin early next year in order to meet the opening date in 2012. The new school is another important piece of the remarkable community that is being created at Playa Vista.
