Clean Up Westchester – Hometown News April 2021 by Grant Francis I moved to Westchester in 1942 to a house at 9163 Ingleport Ave, which is now part of the airport parking lot. My dad worked in aerospace and could have walked to work. My mom was very involved with the community. They were both founding members of the Kentwood Players. Since my mom was PTA president, it seemed logical that I followed in my moms foot steps by getting involved with the community at a young age. I had several jobs as a kid, delivering news papers for the Westcheter News Advertiser. I also worked at Thrifty Drug Store, Woolworths, and Sportsville. I was on the Townhouse Youth Board which sponsored dances after the Westchester High School home football games. I had a Hi-Y group and was a member of the Y's mens club. That club sold Christmas trees, and from those profits I became involved with starting the Westchester Hot Line.

In the mid sixties I got a job teaching at Venice High School and moved down the hill. I got involved with their alumni association, and the chamber of commerce, and with the Venice Heritage Foundation, a group forming a museum for Venice.

In the eighties I moved back to Westchester but found myself wearing two hats, one from Westchester and one from Venice. I became involved in Westchester neighborhood watch with Cyndi Hench, and was responsible for starting a number of new groups, and hanging their signs on many of the light poles in Westchester.

At the turn of the century I retired from teaching and became a handyman for the residents in Westchester, and started more neighborhood watch groups. With my friend Amy Frelinger, we started a fun activity called Westchester Team Challenge. Unfortunately it only lasted one year and was put on hold due to the pandemic.

During the resent pandemic I had some time to think about how I could get further involved in the community. I volunteered with the Venice Chamber of Commerce to help clean up Venice. A few months Into that endeavor I thought that I could get that same program started here in my own community. I sent out some feelers to my neighbors and to NextDoor, asking for volunteers. Ten people responded telling me that it was a great idea. We set a date: Saturday March 27 for our first Clean UP Westchester day. Five volunteers showed up, not a bad start for the inaugural event. One of the volunteers, Paul Davis, a graphic artist, made up a flyer to get more people involved for our next Clean UP Westchester day. I sent that flyer out to ten influential leaders in the community and received five positive responses saying that they would love to sponsor this activity. Not bad for the first time out. One of those positive responses came from Stephanie Davis at Home Town News. I sent her the flyer on Tuesday, she called me asking some questions about the event, and two days later I picked up my copy of the Home Town News from my drive way. She had already written a story about our clean up day and it was being distributed to our neighborhood. From that article I received ten more people who wanted to get involved with our clean up project.

Our second Clean UP Westchester day, was scheduled on April 24, we had an amazing crowd of 35 volunteers show up. We all met in the parking lot behind Mono Poke, and started cleaning up Westchester.
